A. Why use PSNC units?

1. We need to provide some basic _____ for the PSNC educational program for the entire length of the TC program.
2. Need to be able to meet the _____ needs of individuals so they will be able to re-enter society ready to face the challenges of daily living.

Units need to be relevant to the lives of the students—this is accomplished through goal setting—focusing on the key areas of their lives. Helps with motivation.
3. The “Honeymoon effect” wears off.
4. Students have a problem with time. How soon can I get out of here? How many more lessons do I have to do? How long do I have to get this lesson done?
 - A. Students need to have a sense of accomplishment and progress
 - B. Teachers need to help them focus on growth—not “doing time.”

B. How do the units fit into the PSNC?

1. We have divided this whole program into major building blocks which we call “units for growth”
2. Each unit takes _____ weeks to complete.
3. Each unit has a _____ theme, as well as one or more minor themes.

The major theme from one unit to the next is quite different so the student has the feeling they are moving on to something different than what they just finished.

4. Each unit has basic required materials and also electives
5. The student will be assigned 6 different types of studies:
 - a. Bible Studies, PSNC lessons
 - b. Scripture memory work
 - c. Character qualities
 - d. Bible reading
 - e. Books, tapes, CDs, DVDs, tracts, magazine articles
 - f. Other special projects or electives

Even though students may be working on the same unit, they may be assigned _____ lessons or books, based on their individual needs.

6. A **student learning contract** is written for each student for each unit of growth.

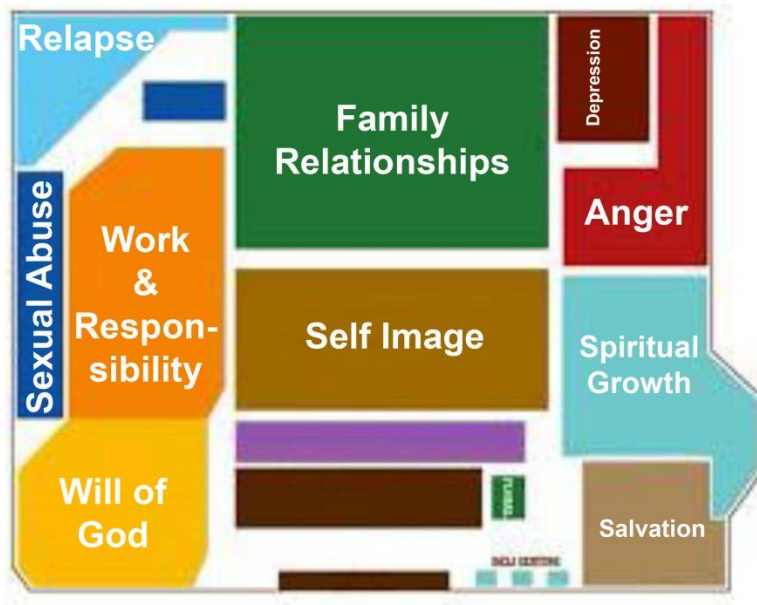
The next work shop will provide more detail on this. In the first contracts, the teacher does most of the work in writing the contracts. As the student goes through the program, the student takes a greater role in writing the contract. Teacher becomes more of an advisor than a director.

7. At the end of the unit, the student is awarded a **certificate of achievement**.

When a student finishes their work for each unit, they will complete an evaluation report explaining what they learned from their work on this unit. Not just content mastery, but personal application progress.

Student needs to learn how to evaluate their growth.

There are other topics that can wait until months later. However, some issues need to be addressed before the last couple months, when they are more receptive to change in that area. Other issues need to wait until a foundation of living for Jesus has been established.
